The Search Institute (www.search-institute.org) is an independent, nonprofit organization that studies and promotes strategies for healthy development for children and youth. Through their research, 40 develop-

mental assets have been identified as the building blocks that help young people grow up healthy, caring and responsible. Communities, schools and afterschool programs that study and incorporate these 40 assets in their programs and activities

see positive outcomes in their member's lives, including success in school, maintaining good health, being a leader, and avoiding high-risk behaviors such as alcohol use, violence, and sexual activity.

Search Institute's "Profile of Student Life: Attitudes and Behaviors Survey," during 1999-2000 school year, surveyed 200,000 young people in grades 6-12 across the country. Of those students, only 8 percent who experienced 0-10 assets reported getting mostly A's in school. In comparison, 46 percent of those who experi-





ence 31-40 assets got mostly A’s. Another example from the 200,000 surveyed was young people who engaged in three or more acts of fighting, hitting, injuring a person, carrying a weapon, or threatening physical harm in the past 12 months. Of those students, 61 percent who experience 0-10 assets engaged in three or more acts of violence as compared to 7 percent of those who experience 31 to 40 assets. (The Asset Activist Toolkit pp 250)

just one of the myriad of books, institutional studies and lectures on positive youth outcomes in high quality community and afterschool organizations.

For success and better student outcomes, we in

the community need to come to the realization that afterschool programs cannot do it alone. Youth development programs, business, religious institutions and policy makers will have to form concerted efforts in supporting

Executive Director’s Message

Our time with our seniors will quickly pass. They are on their way to transitioning into their colleges and careers. As we continue to serve and minister to our seniors on the one hand, we also are putting into place programs and activities that have been proven to engage our younger members, encourage better school performance, and increase life and social skills.

“Restore is a safe-haven” says Ximena

Carrasco, Restore’s Program Director. “However, we are providing more than safety from the streets. We have a proven method for our members to learn the skills needed to be successful in school and in life. Many of our parents cannot pay for after school care. Without us, our kids would have nowhere to go.”

Many federally funded programs and services are facing cuts as Congress and present administration start negotiations

over the 2018 federal budget. Their goal is to shrink the federal government’s role in education. They’re arguing that the programs don’t boost student achievement like they’re supposed to. If the cuts happen, it will affect federally funded after-school programs, known formally as 21st Century Community Learning Centers, Local Art Grants, and the Community Development Block Grants.

Restore is not a 21st Century Community Learning Center. However, we do receive Local Arts Grants and

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Community Development Block Grants. Cutting or eliminating these two grants will have a negative affect on our students. Well-off families can pay for private tutoring, homework help, robotics, summer sleep away camps and the like. Many of our kids only get those services through Restore.

At Restore, we connect with our members, find out their interest and talents and direct donations towards nurturing those interest and talents. Juan is in the ninth grade. Last summer he volunteered

when I was the cook at our summer program. His interest peaked as he learned how to scramble restaurant style looking eggs. He asked me to speak to his mom and dad about his interest in cooking. Tony, who is a senior, wants to be a marine biologist. We got a grant to help him and his father attend a one-day seminar at the Camden Aquarium. We have 16 students in grades 2-8 who are on the honor roll at their schools. We have special honor roll incentives and trips. For all our members, we have the homework center, the reading club and our

annual vocabulary challenge and science weeks.

Fortunately, we are not depended on the federal government, but the prospects of a potential \$20,000 cut in programs will be devastating. As we enter twenty-four years of service, we are grateful that our donors have faithfully supported Restore with their prayers, volunteer efforts and finances. It is because of you that we can provide high quality afterschool and summer programs and

activities to our growing membership. It is because of you that we have staff and volunteers who can connect with each child and teenager who enters our building. It is because of you that we can weather the financial challenges and achieve our yearly goals. It is because of you we can carry our mission to realize the potential of our members and maximize their achievements so they can reach their academic, life and eventual career goals.
